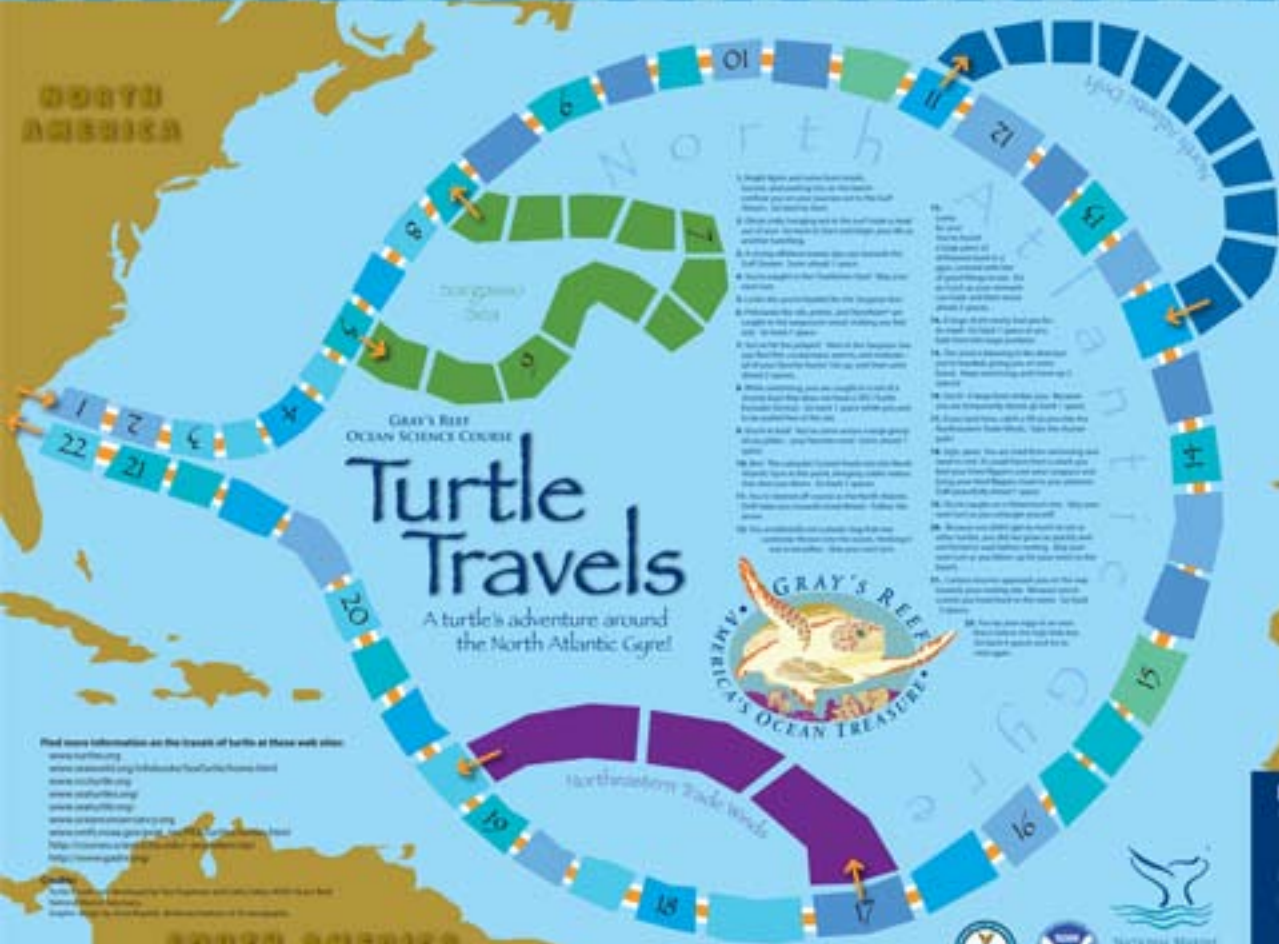

### SEA TURTLES
